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

Well, it is raining again after nearly two weeks of sunshine. I know it was too good to last. The weatherman even apologized for the gross mistake of letting the sun shine that has. So now I reckon that we are due for about nine or ten more days of bad weather to make up for his one beautiful moment. Oh well, it was fun while it lasted. At least I got to go swimming three times. It could have been worse, the sun could have refused to break the clouds.

One of these days I am going to read and write a forty or fifty page letter home. The news is so scarce and we can't write or anything we do because of censorship that letters are of necessity, short. I would like

I visited one pub here that was supposed to have been the headquarters of some of the most famous and agents in England. The pub is still in operation and to tell the truth, most of the pubs, or public houses over here have been situated in the same places for centuries. They are not like our beer gardens. They are a tradition in England like our drug stores do at home where every one gathers to discuss the news and politics. Their beer is very cold, bitter, ale, has a very unpleasant taste to Yanks and is very hard to stomach as it is served warm, as they don't use ice to chill any of their drinks. Most of the people over here in these pubs are alright the I have seen some that were not so good. Their houses especially in small villages are out of mud-bricks or stones from their fields and are very sturdy as the walls are sometimes several feet thick. The roofs are mostly straw thatched and dried under as good as our composition roofs. Their plumbing is early American and their kitchens usually have no cook stove using instead the fireplace which is built in a baking oven and a place to boil or fry other food. Fish and chips is considered the national dish and it is delicious. Otherwise it is

Because the men there are plenty of the boys in here, including to the room, some playing checkers, blackjack, the old army game, some reading and some, the men writing. It is nice to hear and we are all thankful that we are not out there in the line working now. Let me end. Love always.
