Want a minute — what it we could see ourselves as others see us —Gosh!!!

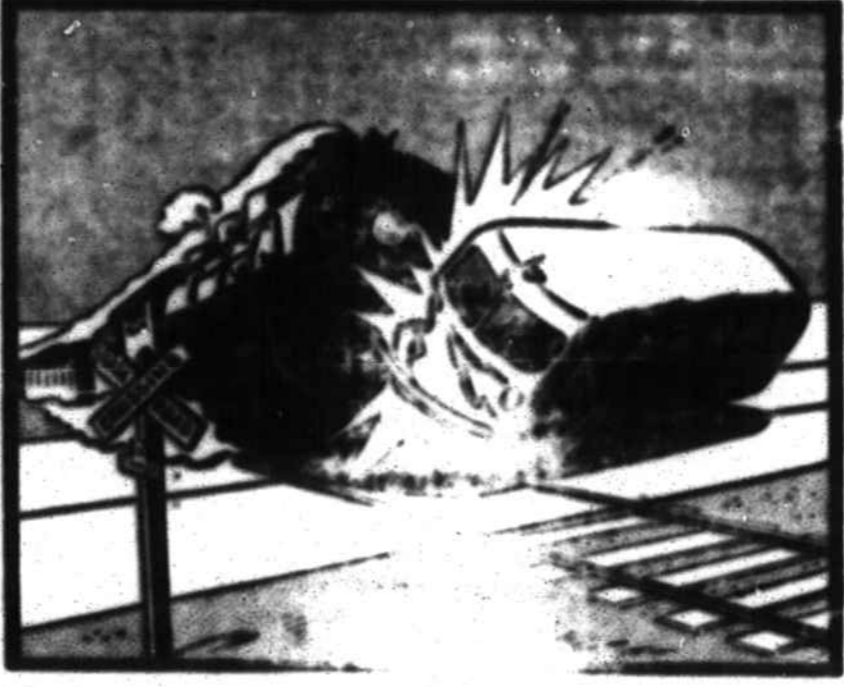

Twenty-four school children and 15 injured!

That was the toll taken long ago by failure of the school bus to comply with requirements and assumptions that the way was clear for attempting to cross a rail crossing. The accident is still here.

The windshield and front windows of the bus were cracked with front shields or clear windows. The crossing was with nothing to obstruct driver's view of the train.

The bus stopped about 25 feet from the crossing, then started over when the train was in the crossing. Two or three hundred people were on board.

The National Safety Council is conducting a special campaign to reduce accidents which every year cost lives and property. 25 trains a total of 22 accidents were a damaging blow to the war transportation effort.
