New York, N. Y.—Howard E. Blood, chairman of the subcommittee on Postwar Distribution for the National Association of Manufacturers, studies the peacetime problem of placing supplies in the 625 United States counties where 70 per cent, or 24,535,764 families reside. The group headed by Mr. Blood, who is president of George Division, B. F. Warner, is confronted by the additional task of seeing that buyers in the 2,389 more sparsely settled counties are supplied.

Arrives At Army Redistribution Center

Pfc. John C. Early, 26, has arrived at Army Air Force Redistribution Station No. 2 in Miami Beach for reassignment proceeding after completing a tour of duty outside the continental United States. Medical examinations and classification interviews at this post, sponsor of several redistribution stations operated by the AAF Personnel Distribution Command for AAF returnee officers and enlisted men, will determine his new assignment. He will remain at the redistribution station about two weeks, much of which will be devoted to rest and education. Pfc. Early, an aviator, armor and gunner, flew four missions the last ten months before completing four years with the AAF in the Central Pacific and returning to America on December 24, 1944. I am serving with the F. A. of the 1st Infantry Division which hit the beach of France a few minutes past 2:00 on D-Day, having the pleasure of joining this outfit D plus 3 and have been with them ever since. We fought through the Normandy Campaign and continuously on the front ever since.
The liberation of Paris being one of our greatest feats.
Our participation in cracking the Siegfried line was also one of our great feats, the Jerry in which we encountered there, seemed to have been our toughest to handle. We are present doing our part and have our sector well in hand. I have been very fortunate, not receiving but one slight wound, for which I was awarded the Medal of the Purple Heart.
My only hope now, along with the other boys, is to put the great knock out punch in.
We are all anxious to get back to our homes and jobs.
As news is plenty scarce, and our light facilities is very poor, I will sign off.
Give my best regards to friends, meantime I will be looking forward to receiving my future Herald's.
