Ocean Flat and Eratias Snow emerged from the East Canyon the morning of July 21, 1841, and arrived at the mouth of the Great Salt Lake Valley, Utah. Later Brigham Young, coming from "mountain fever," arrived with the rear guard of settlers. They "stood with admiration upon the vast valley with the waters of the Great Salt Lake glistening in the sun." War Bonds furnish funds to help supplies going to U.
