Memorial Service For Pvt. Thrift

Memorial services for Pvt. Haskell Thrift will be held on Feb. 14, Sunday afternoon at 3:30, in the Oak View Baptist Church. Rev. E. O. Gore will be in charge of the service. Pvt. Thrift was in the Infantry with the 10th Armored Infantry Co. C. He entered the Army on April 1, 1944 and took his basic training at Camp Wheeler, Ga. He was at home the last of August spending 11 days with his family as he was en route to Ft. Meade, Md. He left for Ft. Meade on Sept. 5 and arrived in England on Oct. 1.

His family received a telegram from the War Department on Dec. 26 reporting he was killed in action in France on Nov. 20, 1944.

Pvt. Thrift was employed at the Phoenix Mills No. 2 before entering the service.

He was a member of the Oak View Baptist Church.

Pvt. Thrift was 27 years of age on Sept. 8 and the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Eliza Thrift of Shelby.

Surviving are his wife, Pauline Hope Thrift, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George J. Hope of Kings Mountain and two daughters, Hazel Grace, age five, Pauline Annette, six months. Also three brothers, Earl, Fred and James, all in the service.

Earl is in the 1st Army, Fred is in the 1st Army, Margaret and James are in the 1st Army. Mrs. Rufus Hale of Kings Mountain.

His body and the casket are in the hands of the funeral home.

Death Claims Mother Of Rev. J. G. Winkler

Mrs. Mary E. Hartley Winkler, 67 wife of the late P. T. Winkler of Granite Falls, died at 11:30 P. M., Tuesday in St. Leo's hospital, Greensboro, where she had been critically ill since last Sunday. Since January, 1944, she had made her home in Greensboro with Dr. Edgar H. Nease, pastor of West Market Street Methodist church, that city, and her daughter, Mrs. Nease.

Funeral services are scheduled for 2:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon at Granite Falls Methodist church, of which Mrs. Winkler was a member, the boy to be at church also one hour preceding the rites. Rev. I. L. Roberts, pastor of the church, will officiate. Interment will be in the church cemetery.

Mrs. Winkler's entire life, before she moved to Greensboro in January of last year, was spent in Caldwell county, in which she was born June 1, 1877, and during the greater part of the time she lived in Granite Falls. Mr. and Mrs. Winkler were widely known in this general area. She was a daughter of the late Col. J. C. Hartley and the late Elizabeth Powers Hartley.

Mrs. Winkler is survived by one son, Rev. J. G. Winkler, pastor of Central Methodist Church, Kings Mountain and Mrs. Mabel W. Nease, wife of Dr. Nease, pastor of West Market Methodist Church, Greensboro.

Army Quartermaster Inspector Gives Talk To Local War Plant

Employees of the Mauney Hosiery Co., local Hosiery mill, who are manufacturing hosiery for both the Army and Navy, were called together by Lt. Jones of the Phil. Q. M. Depot in the plant and told of the importance of their work with the War Department, and urged them to work hard.

Lt. Jones stressed the fact that there just were not any hosiery for the Army or Navy in the warehouses of America. He stated that the Mauney Hosiery Co. had a good record with the Quartermaster Depot as always meeting their delivery schedules, but stated just meeting delivery schedules was not good enough.

He complimented the employees for being approximately 30 days ahead in their deliveries to the Government at the present time, and stated that the Mauney Hosiery Co. had a good record with the Quartermaster Depot as always meeting their delivery schedules, but stated just meeting delivery schedules was not good enough.

Lt. Jones asked that all employees work extra hard during the next few months and try to get out every pair of socks possible in order that none of the boys in service will have to go without socks. He told of the serious need of hosiery on the front lines of battle today and stated that hosiery was so essential that Army Service Forces were actually flying the socks across to the battle fronts as they were needed so badly.

Lt. Jones stated that one pair of socks could keep three men out of service as it would take two men to carry one man with "trench foot" or "frost bitten feet" back to the camp.

Lt. Jones checked the records of the Mauney Hosiery Co. in an effort to see how many employees had worked full time for the past 60 days and told the employees that he would be back in about two weeks to check again to see if the absenteeism was reduced any.

The Mauney Hosiery Co. shipped the Army, Navy, and War Shipping Administration approximately one-half million pairs of hosiery in 1944. This does not include the contracts with the Army Service Forces Exchange who received almost an equal amount.

At the present rate of production the Mauney Hosiery Co. will ship the Army and Navy alone, over 8 million pairs of socks in 1945.

JONES FORTUNE IN HOSPITAL

According to a message received by Mrs. Fortune on Jan. 25, Pvt. I. C. Jones Fortune was slightly wounded on Jan. 11th and is receiving treatment in a hospital some where.

Private Fortune was sent to the hospital on Nov. 16, suffering with trench foot and was under treatment until early in January when he was sent back to the front lines.

A cablegram giving a change of address which presumably indicated a change of hospitals has been received but the family has no definite knowledge concerning his condition.

Young Fortune's wife, the former Miss Hazel Falls, who has been living with her parents in Greensboro, N. C., for several months is visiting her husband's mother, Mrs. W. L. Fortune on West Gold street.

Wounded Kings Mtn. Soldier Recovering In England

Wounded in the left hand by a sniper's bullet while his unit was attacking a town in the Metz sector of France, Private First Class Eldred P. Patterson, 24, of Route 2, is now recovering at a United States Army convalescent center in England. He is taking an active part in a rehabilitation program designed to restore him to top physical shape. Having already received the Purple Heart for previous minor wounds, he has been awarded the Oak Leaf Cluster.

Pvt. Patterson treated his own wound and returned to a battalion aid station. He was flown to England by hospital plane for further treatment.

Before entering the Army he operated his own farm near Kings Mountain. His wife, Lois, and their eight months old daughter, Shirley, are living with his mother at the Kings Mountain address.
