AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOSS
ER STATION, England.—As an airplane mechanic of a B-17 Flying Fortress, Corporal Clyde A. Pruitt, son of Mrs. A. M. Pruitt, Morganston, N. MEDITERRANEAN AIR TRANSPORT SERVICE, Somewhere in Italy

In a ceremony held at a base some 500 miles in Italy, Technical Sergeant Willie B. Blanton, was presented with the presidential unit citation badge by the Commanding General of the Mediterranean Air Transport Service. He received the badge for service with a Troop Carrier group of which he is a former member.

BENNETT POSTAL CLERK
A POSTAL REGULATION STATION

England — 'MIXTURE' MAIL, when center where mail sacks are routed from ships at a north coast port in England to all rail heads in the United Kingdom, this Army postal regulation station handles more than 150,000 sacks of mail and parcels a month.

Pvt. Leonard G. Bennett, of Route 1, Kings Mountain, N. C., is a postal technician who assists in this mail distribution.

Mail is the first cargo to be lifted from the holds of ships. As soon as a ship docks, postal technicians board the ship to locate the mail cargo and expedite its unloading.

During the Christmas rush, this unit handled more than 340,000 sacks of mail.
