

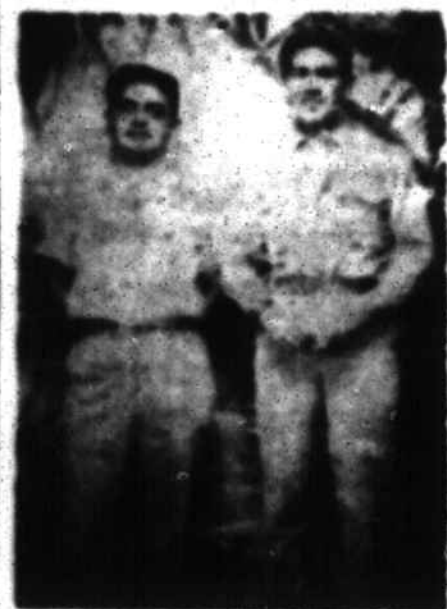

 will be glad to check your brakes in the event your car is not among those in the spot check we are conducting," he continued.
 General D. C. Draper, president of International Association of Police Chiefs, sponsors of the program which will continue through June 15, states that 10 percent of the passenger cars now in operation have dangerous brakes.
 The program is a war emergency effort to conserve autos and to prevent traffic accidents. Every 24 hours 65 persons die, and 2,330 more are injured in auto accidents, and in addition 5,000 cars are leaving the road daily.
 Kings Mountain garages and auto parts companies are joining with the officers in efforts to make the local campaign as near 100 percent complete as possible.

"We ask the cooperation of each motorist," said Patrolman Ward, "and we are confident that all thinking motorists will give it."

The supply of coal during the next 12 months will not be adequate to provide you with as much as you normally burn. Therefore, the Solid Fuel Administration for War has issued instructions prohibiting us from delivering coal to any consumer unless the consumer files with his dealer a

Consumer Declaration

Your coal dealer is now supplied with the necessary form for filing this Declaration. The Declaration requires you to state, among other things, the number of rooms to be heated, your normal coal requirements, and the amount of coal you are ordering.

PLACE YOUR DECLARATION AND ORDER NOW

Only unless you place your Declaration and your order for coal with your dealer is he required to deliver any coal to you.
 If you place your order and your Consumer Declaration with your dealer before May 15, you are entitled to get, before October 1, 20 percent of your normal annual requirements if you are ready, willing, and able to take delivery of any usable solid fuel on terms agreeable to you and the dealer.

Generally a dealer is prohibited from delivering, and the consumer is prohibited from receiving, during the period April 1, 1945, to March 31, 1946, more than 50 percent of the consumer's normal annual requirements.
 Generally a dealer is prohibited from delivering, and the consumer is prohibited from receiving, before September 1, 1945, more than 50 percent of the consumer's normal annual requirements.
