Instructions Given On Overseas Bonds

George Hord, assistant postmaster, has called the attention of Kings Mountain citizens to recent instructions appearing in the Postal Bulletin on mailing of packages to men in service.

The bulletin states that many packages arrive at ports of embarkation in a damaged condition.

Instructions given include use of too light shipping packages, too thin wrapping, improper packing of breakable articles, and shipment of perishable matter, which is prohibited.

The Bulletin points out that only strong, durable boxes should be used, that each box to men overseas should be tied with strong cord, and strong threaded with gummed tape. Also necessary is sufficient cushioning material to prevent loosening of the articles in the package.

In addition, all fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper, and the packages should be clearly labeled or addressed.

Local postal officials are asking the cooperation of the public in mailing boxes to overseas personnel in order that delivery may be insured.

Despite tremendous difficulties and hazards involved the response of LHM's to operational orders was immediate and their performance was of the highest order. They contributed materially to the success of the entire operation."

Fudget In Hospital After Malaria Attack

Captain Philip G. Fudget, King Mountain army medical corps officer is in a hospital in France following malaria attacks, according to a letter received by the Herald this week.

In the letter, the King Mountain doctor writes about the coming of spring in France.

The letter follows:

"With spring in the air and everything suggesting new lease on life I can hardly restrain my flow of thoughts. Spring here is much like it is at home but there isn't near so much of it. However, there is enough for everyone to have been measured by it and feel that the fountain of youth was no myth. Even the tanks and armored spearheads have been affected by it. With our armies rolling toward Berlin victory is in sight. This I believe that rejoicing on the homefront would not be premature — the victory, however, should be tempered by a full realization that this victory by itself has not been without its price in death and injury by many thousands of brave men who have paid the supreme sacrifice to make this victory possible. When our spirit had reached the Rhine I was sent to the front in Italy last summer before the Southern France invasion. Now I am rapidly gaining new strength in a hospital in a quiet section of France."

MEN IN SERVICE

You will be doubt be surprised to finally receive a letter from me.

I have been in the Marine Corps for 18 months 5 of which has been spent in duty overseas and in that length of time I have always received the Kings Mountain Herald from my parents.

Although I have never written I have always thanked you for my heart for such a wonderful little paper. Now I want to personally express my appreciation and many thanks to you and everyone responsible for my getting the greatest little "home news" paper in the world.

In closing I wish to send my best regards to you, the home town people and all the men and women from Kings Mountain serving our country. I would appreciate receiving a letter from anyone from the best little town in the U. S. A.

KANSAS CAPITOL

On the wall of the conference room in the State Capitol at Topeka, Kansas, is a painting of a covered wagon drawn by oxen with the inscription: "They crossed the prairie as of old the pilgrims crossed the sea, to make the West, as they the East, the homestead of the free." To keep all America the homestead of the free today, service men cross seas to the west and east and Americans at home buy War Bonds. This great Kansas emblem of liberty, costing \$3,200,000, was started after the site was chosen by a vote of the people in 1896. The ground on which it stands was donated in 1882 for that purpose by C. K. Holliday, president of the Topeka Association.
