The county board of commissioners, in meeting Monday, set Saturday, June 20, as the day for a vote on the questions of whether or not the county will build a hospital in Kings Mountain, whether it will assume title and indebtedness to the Shelby hospital, and whether or not the Shelby hospital will then be enlarged.

Legal notices giving particulars about the bond vote are published in today's issue of the Herald.

A new registration has been ordered for the bond election and the registration books will be open each day except Sundays and holidays from June 2 until June 23. The latter day has been designated challenge day.

The election will be "against the books," that is, a person registering and failing to vote will, by failing to vote register a vote against all of the proposals.
