About Pacific Action

Pfe. Calvin Harkey, son of Bev. and Mrs. W. L. Harkey, has written his mother a letter including details about the Kings Mountain man's first few days on a Pacific island under Japanese attack.

A portion of the letter follows: . . . This island isn't anything like the other one I was on. It is real cold here. We haven't been here very long but we have already gotten a little taste of war. 1 nardly knew what this war was all about until 1 arrived here. What I've seen is enough for me. 1 wish you could see the caves these Japs have back in the mountains. It's almost impossible to get to them, but the Army is doing a pretty good job. They come


