

NOTICE OF SPECIAL BOND
REDEMPTION AND NEW REGISTRATION
COUNTY OF CLEVELAND,
NORTH CAROLINA

A special election will be held throughout Cleveland County between 6:30 A. M. and 6:30 P. M. Eastern War Time, on Saturday, July 7, 1945, at which there will be submitted to the qualified registered voters of said County the following questions:

1. Shall Cleveland County accept the conveyance to it of the Shelby Hospital owned by Number Six Township in Cleveland County and assume all outstanding indebtedness of said Number Six Township which was incurred for the purpose of erecting said hospital, said indebtedness consisting of \$48,000 Hospital Bonds of Number Six Township, dated May 1, 1922, bearing interest at 6 percent per annum and maturing annually, May 1, \$3,000, 1946 to 1961, inclusive, and levy a county-wide property tax without limitation as to rate or amount for the payment of the principal of and the interest on said indebtedness?

2. If a majority of the qualified registered voters of Cleveland County shall vote in favor of the assumption by Cleveland County of the outstanding indebtedness of Number Six Township as set forth in question numbered 1 above, shall an order finally passed May 21, 1945, authorizing Cleveland County for paying the cost of remodeling and enlarging the buildings which now constitute the Shelby Hospital, and erecting new buildings for said hospital, including the acquisition of the necessary land and necessary equipment, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?

3. Shall an order finally passed May 21, 1945, authorizing not exceeding \$160,000 bonds of Cleveland County for paying the cost of erecting and equipping a county hospital in the City of Kings Mountain, including the acquisition of necessary land, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?

4. If a majority of the qualified registered voters of Cleveland County shall vote in favor of the assumption by Cleveland County of the outstanding indebtedness of Number Six Township as set forth in question numbered 1 above, or if a majority of the qualified registered voters of Cleveland County shall vote in favor of the approval of the bond order mentioned in question numbered 3 above, shall an ad valorem tax not greater than five cents on the one hundred dollars assessed valuation of taxable property in the County of Cleveland be levied and collected annually for the purpose of maintaining any such hospital or hospitals from year to year?

Questions numbered 2 and 3 as hereinabove set forth contain a statement of the purpose for which the bonds are authorized by the order referred to in said questions. If said bonds are issued a tax will be levied for the payment of the principal and interest thereof on all taxable property in the County of Cleveland.

A new registration has been ordered and no one will be permitted to vote unless registered anew. The books for such new registration will remain open from 9:00 A. M. until 6:00 P. M. on each day, except Sundays and holidays, beginning Saturday, June 2, 1945, and closing Saturday, June 23, 1945. On each Saturday during said registration period, said books shall remain open at the several polling places. On Saturday, June 30, 1945, challenges of voters so registered may be made. The polling places in the several precincts will be at the same places at which the last preceding election was held for members of the General Assembly, and the registrar and judges for each precinct are as follows:

Davis Is Recovering After Prison Seige

THE 162nd GENERAL HOSPITAL, England. — Pfc. James R. Davis, 25, of 123 Pine street, Shelby, N. C., has been released from the German prison camp hospital at Leipzig and is now recovering at the United States Army general hospital in England.

Awarded the Purple Heart, he had been wounded in the left foot in January, when his airborne infantry company fought to hold a town in Germany the Luxembourg border.

"The Jerries were using a lot 88s and mortars," he said, "and I was wounded when one of the shells landed near me."

Pfc. Davis was captured, and his wound was dressed by German medics, but "most of the treatment" he received in the hospitals was given

by English doctors, who were prisoners.

After his release, Pfc. Davis was flown to England.

His ward surgeon, Captain Paul W. Schanher, of Mt. Clemens, Mich., said, "Pfc. Davis is making very satisfactory progress, and will be returning soon to the United States."

His wife, Mrs. Mescal Davis, lives at the Pine street address. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ree Davis, live at Phenix Mill, Kings Mountain, N. C. He was employed at the Phenix Mill in Kings Mountain, before enlisting in October, 1939.
