against the French maquis. The trip overseas wasn't a very good one. Captain Padgett injured his back while loading supplies aboard the ship, and, except for one painful trip topside, stayed aboard for the whole journey from New York to Oran. Coincidentally, when he returned to the United States, his ship entered New York harbor and docked in the same slip of the same dock on the same day of the month he had sailed overseas.

The Kings Mountain man treated Nazi wounded as well as American. Near Livorno, he treated 186 Jerries in 18 hours. "Some of them were

but until we hit the Seigfried line we never ran into any full units of Hitler youth or SS men."

Capt. Padgett entered Southern France on D-plus 4, after Nazi fire had messed up a mine-sweeping plan of the Americans. The invading forces followed an alternate entrance plan and managed the task in good order. Except for a lone bomber, no opposition was encountered until the second day when they reached a hilltop to be greeted by Nazi shell fire.

One shell hit about six feet away from the Kings Mountain man. "We dug in then," he said, "but a couple of our men were wounded."

Capt. Padgett, now visiting his family at their home on North Piedmont avenue, is receiving treatment for malaria, which finally hospitalized him in France. He feels he caught the germ in Italy, as did many others, but atabrine and other preventatives kept the fever down.

At the completion of his leave, he returns to the Texas hospital.

land pockets between the U. S. Third and Seventh Armies in March, by racing 60 miles in two days from

Zwiebrucken to Ludwigshaven on the Rhine; and the capture of the large German rail center of Heilbronn after a bitter nine-day battle termed the most fanatical offered by the Germans anywhere east of the Rhine.

Recognition of Carolina men participating in these actions came in the form of five battlefield commissions; three Silver Stars for gallan-

try in action; 27 Bronze Stars, and one Oak Leaf to the Bronze Star for heroic achievement in action or meritorious service; and a 2nd Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal, for meritorious achievement while in aerial flight against the enemy.
