#### Elephant Challenges Lion At King Of Beasts

Schenectady, - "Leon the Lion" may be king of the beasts, but as far as voice is concerned "Toby" the elephant seriously challenged and almost copped "Leo's" sceptre at the circus. A General Electric sound level meter, which measures quantity of sound, tested the vocal renditions of both beasts and found the l'on's to be just a shade stronger.

Technically, peaking, the docile ele phant with his shrill trumpeting registered 109 decibels of sound intensi ty on the sound level meter, while the king of the beasts, after many trials runs below this figure, finally managed to muster 110 decibels. As means of comparison, the elephant's trumpet and the lion's roar equaled in sound intensity the noise at two feet of four men hammering a steel BANK DIRECTOR - Dr. L. P.
