Aboard USS Erben

Aboard The USS Erben is The
 Western Pacific. Fred B. Spencer,
 steward's mate, second class, whose
 wife, Thelma, lives on Route 1, Kings
 Mountain, N. C., fought for 90 days
 aboard this destroyer off the Japa-
 nese home islands and the Ryukyus
 chain stretching southward to Oki-
 nawa.

Three Japanese planes were shot
 down by the ERBEN'S guns. Her
 crew also helped destroy 14 others
 during pre-invasion strikes and op-
 erations against enemy's island strong-
 hold.

Rescue missions performed by the
 ERBEN saved the lives of 25 offi-
 cers and men, with one rescue tak-
 ing place during an attack by two
 enemy planes.

Highlight of the destroyer's cruise
 came during a Fleet strike off Kyu-
 shu when five Jap planes were de-
 stroyed in as many minutes. With
 other ships in her unit, the ERBEN
 was ready for the attackers. Three
 of the planes were shot down in
 short order into the sea.

The ERBEN won credit for knock-
 ing down the fourth plane, which
 headed for the destroyer, but veered
 from its course when badly hit by
 gun-fire and landed in the sea 100
 yards from the ship. An alert look-
 out spotted the fifth plane, which
 was shot down before it could ful-
 fill its mission.

 Command.

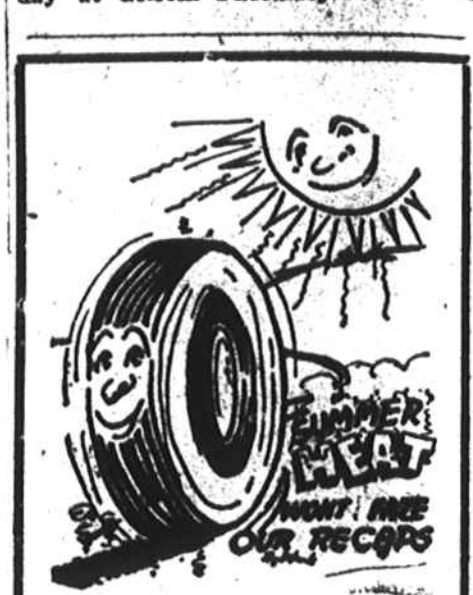
Pfc. Dover is assigned to Main-

 in Wilson and Wayne counties.

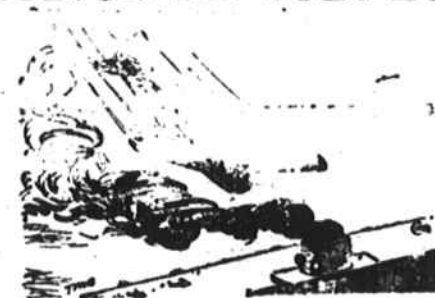
