Pfc. Franklin To Be En Route Home Soon

Assembly Area Command, France—Company "A" of the 638th Tank Destroyer Battalion, first combat unit to report to Camp Boston in the Assembly Area Command is preparing to return to the United States for further training. In this company is Pfc. Ernest F. Franklin, 42 Maple st. Kings Mountain, N. C.

Camp Boston is one of 17 camps set up in Northern France to speed the shift of troops from Europe.

Company "A" was the 638th's first company to fire at the Germans when it went into action last November. Working in support of elements of the 84th Infantry Division, Company "A" helped blast parts of the Siegfried line and helped flatten and occupy the town of Wanlin, Welin and Beauraing.

During the Ardennes campaign the company fought into Manhav, Gramvil and Beho. With the 84th Division, the company drove through Roerich and other Rhineland cities in the rush to the Rhine.

At Camp Boston, men of Company "A" are receiving physical examinations and resting after their war tasks.

Although the unit is scheduled to be at camp only a short time, members will be allowed passes to visit historic sights in the vicinity. Camp Boston is located near Reims, famous French cathedral city and scene of the signing of the German surrender.

Kings Mountain Man Is With Water Supply Unit

With Advance Supply Troops in Germany — Water purifying points are being set up in key spots for American troops returning from Southern Germany in west will be the biggest job yet tackled by 518th Engineer Water Supply Company, veteran supply troops who have already dispensed 25 million gallons of portable water to soldiers throughout Africa, France and Germany. It was announced today by Continental Advance Section Headquarters. In this unit is Pfc. Thomas O. Ballott, route 2, Kings Mountain, N. C.

The operation is expected to exceed that of Southern France when the 518th purified and distributed 720,000 gallons of water a day from 18 water points stretching from Marseille to Luneville, according to Captain Warren B. Weber, of Belleville, Ill., Company Commander. Water points are already functioning in Kaiserlautern, Sarreguemines, Heidelberg and Mannheim. Points further south will be set up soon to receive Seventh Army water supply companies for redeployment.

The 518th are Army-trained specialists in water chemistry. They were the first water supply unit to be organized in this war at Camp Living-

ston, La. Landing on D-day with the Western Task Force in 1942, the 518th set up their first water point at Arzew, France. Later after the Tunisian campaign, they supplied the thousands of troops readying for the Sicilian invasion. After the fall of Rome, they were moved there to supply fresh water to the Fifth Army.
