Kings Mountain Splits Double Bill With Dallas

Kings Mountain and Dallas split a benefit basketball doubleheader here Tuesday night, as Dallas girls thumped Kings Mountain by 17-10 and Kings Mountain boys evened the score with a 64-36 victory.

The net proceeds of the bill were \$32.75, boosting further the fund to provide medical care for injured high school athletes.

The Dallas girls were led by Beirgen and M. Cloninger, while Richardson and Ledford, with three points each, were high for Kings Mountain. The Mountaineers, with the assistance of Earl Ruth who scored 13 points, were too much for Dallas throughout the game. Henry Neisler tallied 11 points to share in high score honors. For Dallas, two of four Cloningers on the squad were high point men, R. Cloninger getting 11 and B. Cloninger 7.
