## Disabled Veteran Gets Civil Service Place

Officials of the Fourth United States Civil Service Region at Winston Salem, have disclosed details of the placement of a disabled veteran of World War II in the U. S. Coast Guard Yard, Curtis Bay, Md.

After graduating from the Annapolis, Maryland High School, Harry C. Millhausen, aged 20, worked in a machine shop. The war only interrupted his training in becoming a machinist.

Serving with the Marine Corps in the Marshall Islands, South Pacific, Mr. Millhausen suffered a hand grenade wound during the repulse of a night attack by the Japs. Dry gangrene resulted making necessary the amputation of his left forearm.

Discharged from service with an artificial limb, he took a job as a laborer while waiting for an opportunity to begin his apprenticeship for his trade as a machinist trainee when the course is set up at the Coast Guard Yard at Curtis Bay, Md.

This appointment is one of the many placements of physically handicapped veterans in Federal employment.

For bravery and unexcelled service beyond the call of duty, he holds the blue Presidential Citation as well as the Gold Wreath for meritorious service and the Good Conduct Medal.

Emery also wears Silver Air Corps Glider Wings and the American Theater ribbon.

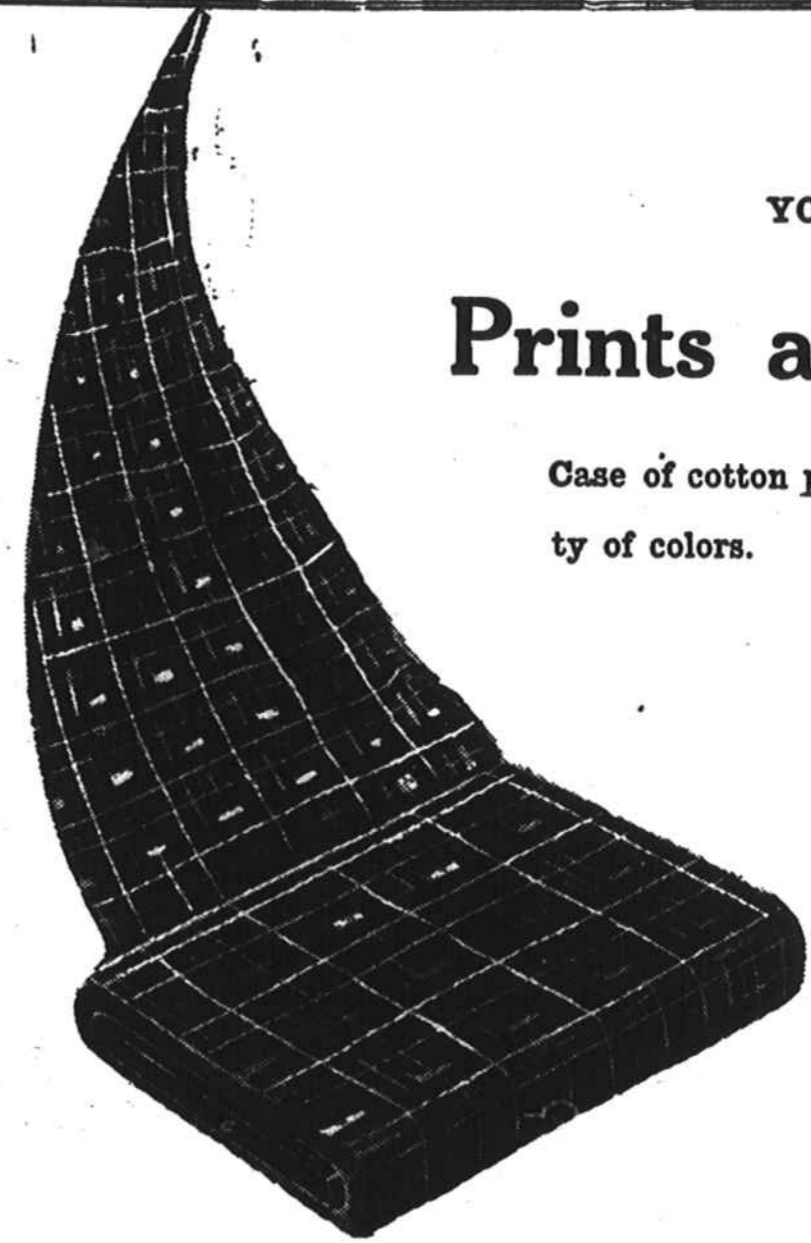
