George Womic Falls Dead While Working

George Womic, 45 year old negro painter of Kings Mountain, remembered as the man who dashed into his blazing home on December 21 to rescue his small daughter, fell dead Monday morning while working in the home of Bob Lynn.

A painter by trade, Womic was sanding the floors of the Lynn home when he collapsed. Kings Mountain officers who investigated, called Coroner Roscoe Lutz, who with Sheriff Raymond Cline, made a further investigation. Coroner Lutz said a physician's report attributed death to a

Three More Local Men Get Discharges

Womic's small daughter, still in the Shelby hospital undergoing treatment for severe burns suffered last December, was rescued by her father who suffered severe burns about the hands in the attempt. Citizens of Kings Mountain and Shelby had made contributions to the family of 10 children after the home had been leveled by fire.

Federal services for Womic were held Wednesday afternoon.
