Other Fuels Push

Coal for Markets During the last 20 years, coal as a source of industrial energy has been losing ground steadily to com-peting fuels, according to the Alex ander Hamilton Institute. The way stimulated a revival, but the advent of peace shows the downward trend to be resuming. Unless the industry can find some means of halting the trend, there is every prospect of economic disaster for

the industry. Various advantages claimed for its competitors are responsible for the trend away from coal, but the leading factor is probably that of cost. Since 1916, the price of coal relative to other commodity prices has steadily risen, whereas the price of petroleum or natural gas has steadily fallen.

A tremendous expansion of barge shipments and pipe line construc-tion has lowered the transportation costs of oil and gas, so that today this cost is only 4 or 5 per cent of their value. Transportation costs for coal, on the contrary, have risen since 1929 and are today about 50 per cent of its value. Labor costs, steadily increasing, now account for 60 per cent of the present average coal price of \$2.93 a ton at the mine. The labor costs of competing fuels, on the other hand, have shown a slight decrease and amount to about I per cent of the total cost of production.
