Split Dove Season Opens September 16

Of interest to many hunters in this section is the recently released hunting and fishing laws bulletin published by the Division of Game and Inland Fisheries department of the North Carolina Department of Conservation and Development.

Dove season opens in this section September 16 to September 30 with a split season opening again on December 2 to January 15. Bag limit for a day is 10 with the possession limit also 10.

Deer season opens on October 15 and closes January 1 with the season limit 2 males, and with some areas allowing hunting only on weekend days.

There is no bag limit on opossum and raccoon with dog and gun, the season opening on October 15 and closing February 15.
