THE SO-CALLED RIGHT TO STRIKE

IT IS A MISCONCEIVED RIGHT TO REPUDIATE THE AND TO ESTABLISH A LABOR DICTATORSHIP OVER INDUSTRY

The erroneous conception of the right to strike has been confused with the constitutional right of a worker to quit work. The right to strike and the right to quit work represents acts radically different in nature and the distinction should be definitely estab-

The constitutional right of a citizen to give up his job and quit work is an essential factor of his freedom as an American citizen. But, when he quits work he automatically severs all business relations with the employer; therefore he has no right to interfere with his former employer's business. Neither has his former employer the right to interfere with any new connection he may wish to make. Having no Constitutional claim on the job, he has not right to interfere with anyone applying for that job. These are plain facts which every American citizen whose mind has not been poisoned by Communism understands and accepts.

The perverted definition of the strike has a radically different meaning from the Constitutional right to quit work. It erroneously claims the right to quit work and still hold the job. It also claims the right of employees to close an industry and keep it closed by various means · of compulsion, to force the granting of their demands.

Employees have no Constitutional right to cause serious loss to any employer's business, nor to inconvenience and deprive the public of the produce of that industry. Neither have they the right to demand wages for the time lost during a strike. Increased wages should commence from the time that the increase is granted and not rerctive to some past date.

The constitution provides for equal rights for all citizens; no special privilege granted to any minority group of people. Therefore, the recognition of these so-called lights of organized labor by the Administration, Congress and the Supreme Court, in our opinion, is a violat'on of the Constitution which every elected official and representative is under oath to uphold. And, because of this the public and the government have suffered. The public for want of much needed goods and the thwarting of the law of supply and demand. The Government, by the loss of revenue which may necessitate the enactment

of greatly increased income taxes after the election this tall. You may not see it but it will affect you-no fooling. This means you, no matter whether you are classified as capitalist, white collar class, non-union or union labor-all are consumers.

STRIKE AGAINST THE FARMERS

In the General Motors strike, the corporation suffered, but not as much as the public.

When the C. I. O. closed the farm equipment plants the corporation suffered less than the farmers who could not get implements to cultivate and harvest their crops, nor parts to repair their old machines.

The C. I. O. Tobacco Union is threatening to tie up the tobacco industry which will seriously affect the farmers. The "Tobacco News" quotes their leader, Philip Kerits, as saying: "The more delay we have, the closer it gets to the leaf season. And, if we have to strike, when is a better time than when tobacco is lying around the warehouses?" If the strike is called, the farmers will be the heaviest losers.

This cynical and ruthless psychology of the C. I. O. in bringing hardships on the innocent public in order to force the Government to order a settlement in favor of the unions has gone too far. The public is sick of it.

In order to prevent the wreeking of our economic system, all patriotic citizens should join The Farmers' State Rights Association, Inc., and bring our case to the attention of the Government, Congress and demand that the state legislatures ratify these joint resolutions. to wit:

1. The limitation of the tenure of the President to ONE term of six years.

2. Define and specify the rights of the public, the employer and the employee.

Let your conscience be your guide to support of this campaign, both morally and financially, to preserve our free enterprise system, and God given rights that are guaranteed by the Constitution, which is based on God's Eternal purpose, for the benefit of
