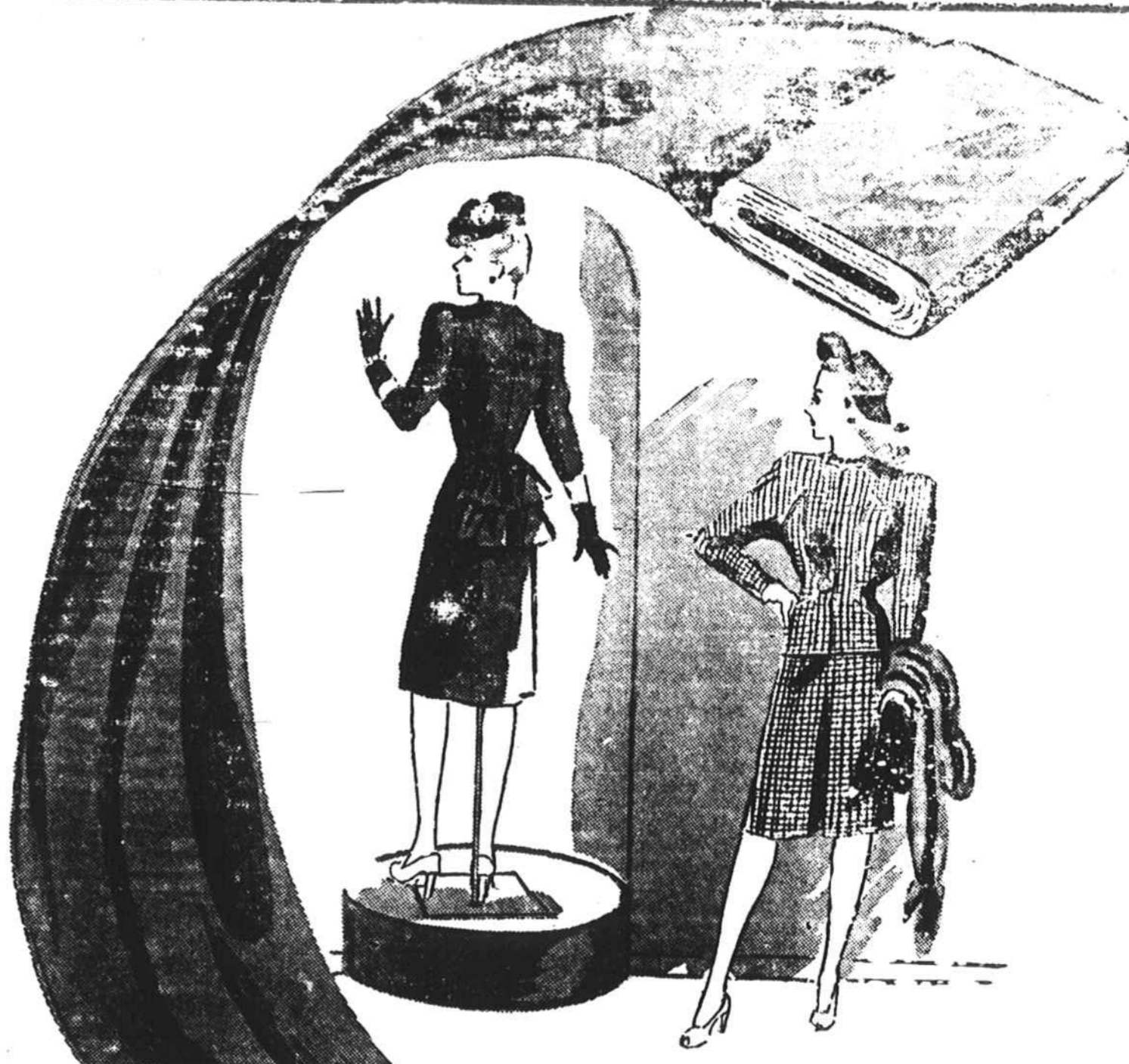
Following play, the hostess served a delicious salad and sandwich course with coffee.

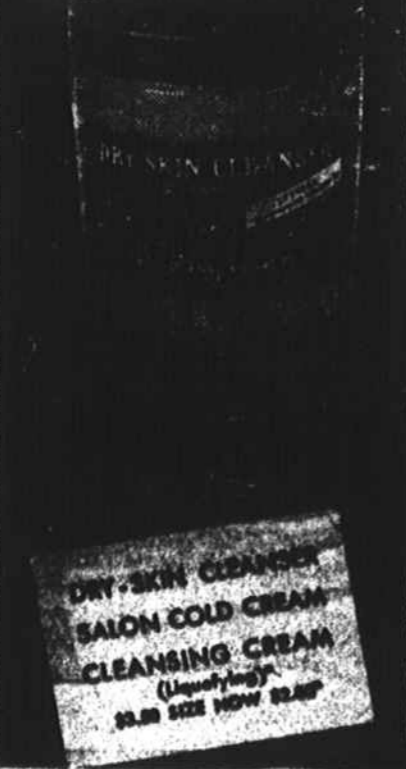
