Mrs. A. B. Prince is in the Presbyterian Hospital, Charlotte, recuperating from a major operation which she underwent on Friday.

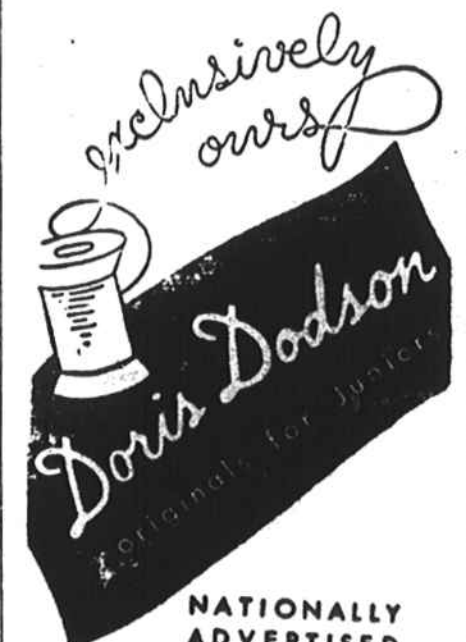
Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Comer returned home on last Saturday and reported that the place was clean and well kept and that the folks were getting plenty to eat.
