"The recent month of September has given Office heaviest load of any month, due to flood or applicants for unused leave pay, and phone calls for information on regulations governing these applications.

Send Santa Mail Early, Says Navy

Charleston, S. C. — Christmas parcels for Naval and Marine Corps personnel in the extreme forward areas should be mailed not later than October 15, to afford probability of delivery before Christmas day it was announced by the Sixth Naval District Public Information Office. Parcels for personnel known to be in an area permitting subsequent mailing may be mailed at appropriate dates selected by the sender.

It is important that parcels for overseas be packed in exceptionally strong containers, that the senders follow the postal regulations which prohibit mailing perishables overseas, that the full name, serial number, and complete address of the recipient be used, and that all packages containing valuables be insured.

It should be noted that poor packing often results not only in the loss of one package, but also in damage to other parcels or obliteration of their addresses.

T-B Survey Was Short Of Goal

A total of 26,605 Cleveland County citizens underwent X-Rays in the mass tuberculosis survey conducted in the county during September.

Though the goal was 30,000 examinations, Dr. Herbert Hudgins, county health officer, and Dr. E. E. Geheber of the U. S. Public Health Service, expressed themselves as well-pleased with the results of the survey.

One of the units is remaining in Shelby to make retakes of doubtful cases.

Mountain and throughout the county for making the survey a successful one," said Mrs. W. G. Stallings, executive secretary of the Cleveland County Tuberculosis association. "Without the cooperation of all, it would not have been possible to conduct a successful survey."
