Prescription Service For Vets Now Available

Winston-Salem. — Home town prescription service for North Carolina veterans who have service incurred disabilities or ailments is now in operation, the Veterans Administration regional medical service announced today.

Made possible by a recently signed agreement between VA and the North Carolina Pharmaceutical Association the service enables a veteran who has been authorized for medical treatment to get prescriptions filled by pharmacists in his own town. Previously, delays were incurred while prescriptions were filled free, via mail, by the VA itself.

A doctor who has been authorized to treat a veteran with service-connected disorders can now sign prescription for presentation by the veteran to his druggist. The prescription is filled on the spot, and the druggist sends a report to the state Pharmaceutical Association, which in turn bills the VA for cost of the service each month.
