

The letter follows:

"According to a promise I made you at New Prospect at the Iscam reunion I am setting you a sketch of the beginning of Baptist history in Cleveland county, "Drury Dothins came up here from York, S. C. in 1810. He joinel up with James Wehle or Golden Valley, Ruthertord county, for the purpose of organizing Baptist churches.

"At that time there was not a Baptist church in what is now Cicveland county. The first church they organi zed was Sandy Kun, 1812; next, Zion, 1814; then in the order listed: Beaver Dam. Zoar, Double Springs. Boil ing Springs, Bethlehem, Capurnaum (now Waco), New Prospect, New Hope, and several in what is still Rutherford county. Cleveland county had not been formed at that time but was organized in 1840.




