SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Mr. Bunn Patterson of the Patterson Grove community has several acres of small grain which is now ready for grazing. Mr. Patterson seeded two bushels each of oats and barley per acre, during the last week of August. He says: "Experience has taught me that small grain for late fall and winter grazing helps keep milk production up and saves me many dollars in feed bills."
 Messrs James and Fritz Ware of the Patterson Grove community have good stands of alfalfa. The alfalfa was seeded just prior to the rains in the latter part of September.

Conrad Hughes of the Dixon community is getting soil conserving practices established on his farm. Last spring he planted several acres of kudzu in water disposal areas. This fall, he is seeding several acres of permanent and temporary pastures and will construct several thousand feet of terraces on his farm. These practices are part of the farm plan for soil conservation which Mr. Hughes worked out with the assistance of the Broad River soil conservation district.

G. L. Hamrick of the Lattimore community will apply lime and phosphate to his permanent pasture this season. Mr. Hamrick has approximately 35 acres in pasture grasses.
 It is just as important to put drill crops on the contour as it is row crops. When drilled on the contour, water stays in each furrow or implement mark and soaks into the ground. This method of farming not only conserves water for plant growth but also keeps it from running directly downhill and taking the topsoil with it. In addition to saving water and soil, this practice will increase the yield and cut down on the wear and tear on farming implements.


John R. Bridges Enroute 'State-Side'

With the Eighth Army in Iwakodate, Japan (Delayed). — Sergeant John R. Bridges, 20 years old of Kings Mountain, N. C., an infantry man serving with the 11th Airborne Division, is on his way home. His date of "state side" arrival is dependent upon the speed with which he is processed at the Fourth Replacement Depot, Yokohama, and upon the available shipping.
 Sgt. Bridges was inducted into the Army at Fort Bragg, N. C., in January 1945. After receiving his infantry basic training at Camp Croft, S. C., he joined the 27th Infantry Division on Okinawa in July 1945. In December of that year, he transferred to the 11th Airborne Division at Sendia Japan.
 Having served in the Pacific Theater, Bridges has the following awards to his credit: the Asiatic Pacific ribbon, the Japanese Occupation ribbon and the Victory medal.
 The Armed Forces Leave Act of 1946 authorizes Veterans Administration to accept "terminal leave" bonds in lieu of cash for the payment of premiums on all forms of National Service Life Insurance.

Veterans Administration conducts the biggest mutual insurance system in the world. Within the last six years it has written more than 15,000,000 National Service Life Insurance policies having a total value of nearly 150 billion dollars. Almost one third of this amount is still in force.
