

GENERAL RULES FOR USE OF THE CLUB HOUSE

All persons or organizations using the Club House for any purpose shall be required to abide by the following regulations:

I. Privilege for renting the Club House must be obtained from the treasurer of the Senior Woman's Club.

II. Persons or organizations desiring to use the Club House shall designate one individual and if they so desire two additional persons who shall sign the agreement slip. This individual and his co-signers will be held responsible for the payment of fees, for payment of any damage that may occur, and for carrying out the regulations herein stated. Two of the signers must be adults.

III. General regulations:

KEY

Information regarding the key will be obtained from the club treasurer.

FLOORS

Unless specified upon application the kitchen and dining room down stairs may not be used.

Privilege of using the men's toilet on the ground floor is included at all times.

HEAT

Information for using the heating system will be obtained from the Club Treasurer.

For an afternoon activity the heat shall not be turned on before 10 a. m. on the day of the activity.

For a night activity the heat shall not be turned on before 8 p. m. on the day of the activity.

All outside windows and doors shall be kept closed while the heat is turned on. Temperature shall be controlled by adjusting the thermostat and not by opening windows and doors. At no time shall the thermostat be turned above 70 degrees. The thermostat shall be turned to the lowest degree at least 30 minutes before pulling switch to the furnace.

Some responsible person who understands the use of the furnace shall be in charge of operating the heat for the building.

LIGHTS

All lights must be turned out upon leaving the building. A penalty of one dollar shall be paid for failure to turn all lights out.

LOCKING-UP

All doors and windows must be securely locked, all lights turned out, and the heat turned off at the closing hour designated.

HOURS

The Club House shall be closed and lights out by one o'clock at all times except on Saturday night when it shall be closed and all lights out by 12 o'clock.

All decorations shall be removed not later than the day following the day of the activity by persons or organizations using Club House.

CLEANING

Unless otherwise specified upon application the Club will assume the responsibility of cleaning the building.

INTOXICANTS

Intoxicants in any form shall at no time be permitted in the Club House or on the Club Grounds.

Persons under the influence of intoxicants to any degree shall be removed immediately from the Club House and the Club House grounds.

Their removal shall be the responsibility of the signers of the agreement slip.

CLUB PROPERTY

At no time may any dish, glass, kitchen utensil, silver ware, or other property be taken from the club house.

DANCES

Public or script dances shall at no time be held in the Club House.

All dances shall be private, guests by invitation only.

At least four chaperones, responsible persons whose names shall have previously been submitted for approval to the Club treasurer, shall be on duty the entire time of the dance and remain until the building is closed.

These chaperones, two ladies and two gentlemen, shall have access to a copy of these agreements.

At not time shall there be less light on the dance floor than that furnished by two overhead lights of no less than 100 watts each.

YOUTH CENTER

These regulations hereinset forth shall apply to the Youth Center with the exception of the fees and cleaning.

JUNIOR WOMAN'S CLUB

The same status for using the Club House is given the Junior Woman's Club as that of the Senior Club.

CHURCHES

Any Church wishing on any occasion to use the Club House or Club House property is invited and the Club House shall be made available to the Church.

DAMAGE

An account of any damage shall be kept for reference for damage done to any Club property.

FEES

Dinners and banquets, 100 or less, \$5.00.
Dinners and banquets, more than 100, \$8.00.
Dances, \$5.00.

Organization meetings \$1.00 per hour or fraction thereof.

These fees do not apply to activities by the Woman's Club, Junior Woman's Club, or the official Club hostess.

FAILURE TO CONFORM TO THESE REGULATIONS MAY DEBAR SUCH PERSONS OR ORGANIZATIONS FROM FURTHER USE OF THE CLUB HOUSE.

Orders Decrease in Air

Forces' Civilian Staff

WASHINGTON.—Army air forces ordered a 30 per cent reduction in the number of its civilian employees.

General Spaatz, air forces commander, said the number of employees would be reduced from 163,000 to 131,000 between October 1 and January 1. He said the reduction will be "across the board" with high and low salaried employees treated equally in proportion to numbers.

War department said reductions by other army branches had been agreed to and would be worked out in detail.

Reductions will be made in accordance with President Truman's directive that the army and navy must absorb the cost of 14 per cent salary increases voted by congress to government civilian employees, and also costs of pay increases ranging from 10 to 50 per cent voted military personnel.

Door-to-Door Service

Many business organizations and veterans are turning to the commercial trailer coach as a method of providing door-to-door sales and service. Some veterans have divided their coaches into part business and part living quarters.

Test Switchboard Lamps

One electrical manufacturing plant alone produces and checks daily more than 26,000 tiny lamps for telephone switchboards. Samples are placed on life test boards, and many have been burning since January, 1944.

Reeded Edges

The edges of coins are reeded or corrugated to prevent fraudulent removal of metal and also to protect them from wear. Nickels and one-cent pieces do not wear so rapidly and the metal in them has little intrinsic value. Therefore, only silver and gold coins are made with reeded edges. All coins, however, are milled; that is, they are made with a raised border to protect the face itself from wear.
