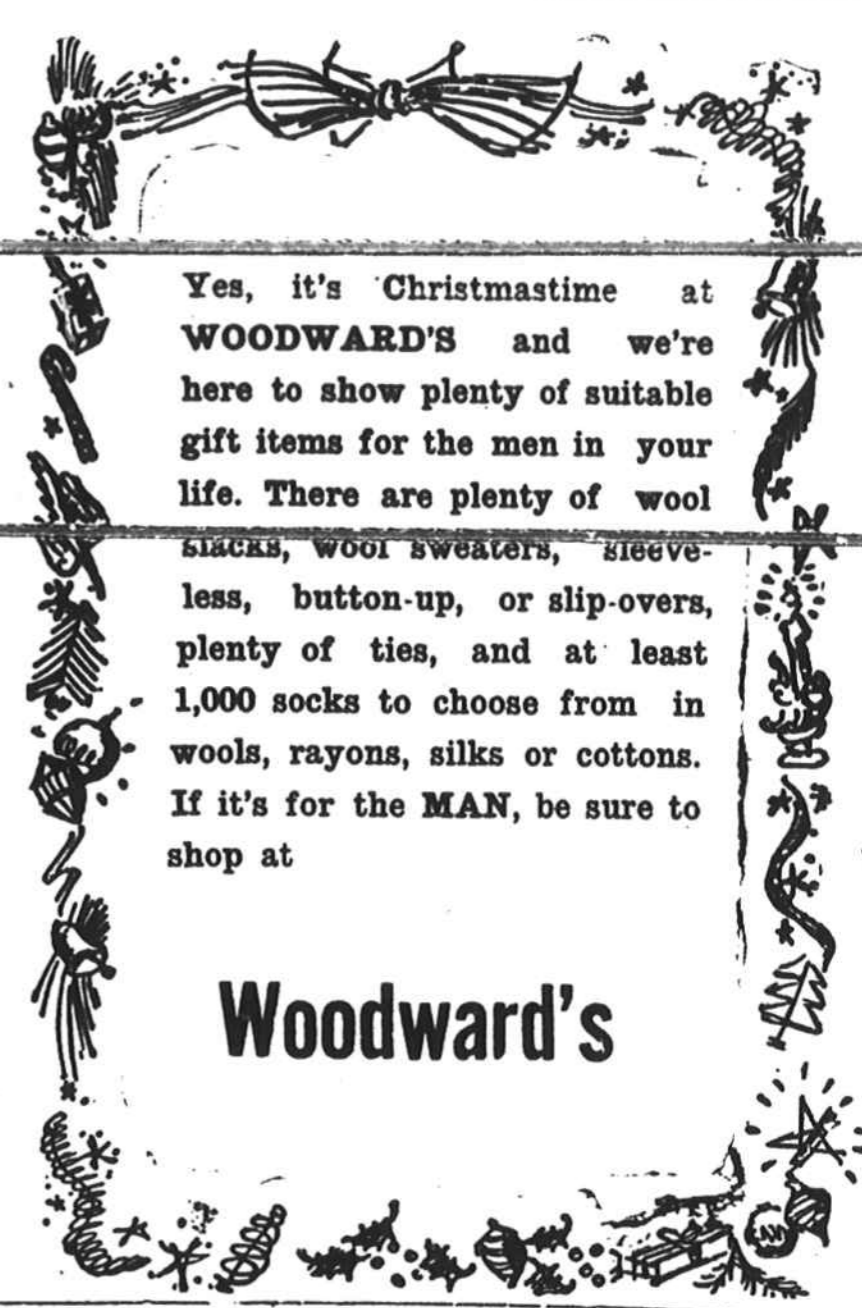
DIVORCED
