Harris is one of these fellows who not only eats, sleeps, and talks garden ing on any and all occasions but also grows a garden in Raleigh of which snyone would be justly proud. Regardless of what time of the year you visit his garden, he always has something growing and he is full of plans of what he intends to plant in the near future.

Not only is the Harris garden an all-year garden but it also combines fruit along with the vegetables. There one finds strawberries, blackberries, Boysenberries. Youngberries, and a number of apple trees that keep the family supplied with fruit throughout the year.

At Christmas the Harris family was sating strawberries. Boysenberries, and peaches from the freezer locker and there were apples stored in a keg covered with soil in the garden and still other apples wrapped and stored in the garage.

In the garden there were jurnips, mustard, knie, and collards. Usually at this time of: the year the Harris family also has some parsips but this tenson they are missing. Not so long ago there were fall squash.


