Two Men Sentenced For Driving Drunk

Two out-of-town men were sentenced in Recorder's court here last Monday afternoon on charges of driving drunk. D. W. Jenkins, of Shelby, was given six months, free on payment of \$75 and costs and loss of his drivers license and Mars S. Duncan, of Spartanburg, S. C., was sentenced six months, suspended on payment of \$75 and costs, and was sent to jail for non-payment of the fine.

Evell Lackey, on charges of possession of liquor and carrying a concealed weapon, was found guilty and sentenced to sixty days, suspended on payment of \$50 and costs and confiscation of the weapon.

H. J. Waddell, resident of South Carolina, was fined \$75 and costs for having in his possession eight half-pints of liquor. Also on possession of liquor charges, Kenneth Clay was found not guilty and Ethyle Louise Jenkins was fined \$10 and costs.
