Huneycutt To Aid School Evaluations

J. E. Huneycutt, high school principal, has been extended an invitation by the State Department of Public Instruction to represent the Southern Association of high schools in an evaluation of high schools in Western North Carolina. Beginning Tuesday of next week the following schools will be evaluated: Hendersonville high school, Fassifern school, Blue Ridge school and Montreat College high school. All of these schools have been on the Southern Association list for 15 or more years and are being evaluated in a routine check of all schools of long-standing membership in the Association.

The evaluations will be similar to the evaluation of the Kings Mountain high school which was held last year. The schools will be checked on some 1600 items relating to instruction, school administration, pupil progress, guidance, library, school plant, etc.

In addition to Mr. Huneycutt, the evaluation committee will include Professor B. Y. Tyner of Meredith college, who assisted in the local evaluation last year, and other members of the State Department of Public Instruction.
