The Clippers are beginning a campaign to defend the Dixie League title which they won last year.

Forty candidates for the Mountaineer football team have been undergoing body conditioning exercises since August 18 in preparation for the heavy card of games this fall according to Coach Don Parker of Central high school.

With only one returning letterman from last year's powerful team and with no head coach to replace last year's coach Clyde Canipe, who resigned two weeks ago, the first game on the schedule for the locals is in Mt. Holly September 12 against a reported powerful Hawk eleven.

Kings Mountain defeated Mt. Holly last year in City Stadium here by a score of 32 to 7 after the Hawks rode the air waves to a quick score in the early minutes of the game.

First home game on the Central card is with Bessemer City's Scrappy Lads on September 26.

Final game of the schedule is here on Tuesday before the school's Thanksgiving holidays, with the powerful Lincolnton Wolves as visitors. Lincolnton took the measure of the Mountaineers in the opening game last year, the score 13 to 7.

cigarettes. In addition, he allegedly took the cash register outside the store, broke it open, and removed a small amount of cash.

Gregory's prison record was said to include a 5-7 year sentence from Gaston for manslaughter, received January 29, 1937 (released September 12, 1942; 30 days for public drunkenness in August 1944; 90 days for public drunkenness and assault on a female in May 1945; 30 days for public drunkenness in August 1945 and the current sentence of 6-7 years.

Charges of assault against the officers arose when citizens reported the convict had been removed from the patrol car and taken into the woods, where they heard loud screams.
