William O. Weir, well-known Kings Mountain man, announced his purchase of Piedmont Drug Store from Mrs. C. D. Blanton and Mrs. John L. McGill, and Mr. and Mrs. A. J Hoffman, of Shelby, have announced purchase of the Waffle Shop from James S, Hamrick.


Sale of the Piedmont Drug Store was concluded last Friday. Mr. Weir who formerly managed the firm, has recently held a position with Burlington Mills Phenix plant here. He is a veteran of five years service during World War II, most of it spent in the Pacific theater.

The Waffle Shop transaction was completed Tuesday. The Hoffmans have been in the cafe business for eight years having operated until recently the Hoffman Grill in Shelby. They have announced that the firm will discontinue its policy of staying open 24 hours daily, opening at 6 i. m. and closing at midnight daily.


