Kings Mountain Independents entered the finals of the Lions club sponsored semi-pro basketball tournament Friday night with a thumping 53 to 36 victory over the highly-rated Monroe VFW team. Tyner all-stars of Shelby made the finish of the tournament an all-Cleveland county one with a decisive 45 to 27 triumph over North Brook in the first game of the night's double-header.

Big Ed Hopper paced the locals to victory with a basket-swishing 14 points to take scoring honors for the night. Bill Williams had 10 points. The Independents, playing without the services of three of their performers, Bob Hunter, Al Crisp, and John Gold, started off with a bang after Monroe scored first and ran up an impressive 16 to 2 first quarter score. The Kings Mountain team led at half-time by a score of 29 to 17.

Trull paced Monroe with 12 points. Johnson added only 5 points to his bid for tournament high scorer to run his total to 27 for the two games he played.

Bowen paced the Shelby attack with 12 points, followed closely by Dickie Weaver with 11 and Tessener with 10.

Karl Anthony had 9 points for North Brook.

First Annual Folk Festival Planned

Chapel Hill. — For the first time, ballad singers, dancers and other keepers of folklore of the Outer Banks of North Carolina and of the remote Smokies will meet and swap tunes. A Folk Festival has been announced for June 18-19 at the University of North Carolina, with Bascom Lamar Lunsford, of Leicester, N. C., as director. Lunsford now is combing the state for bearers of the folklore which survived in many isolated places, and strangely enough, people in the two most widely separated parts of North Carolina offer him the most possibilities.

That is because both Bankers and mountaineers sprang largely from the same stock, and also because geographic barriers for many years discouraged infiltrations of new emigrants. As a consequence, you have to travel nearly 500 miles across Piedmont North Carolina to hear a mountaineer use the word "mon-micked" just as it is used at Ocracoke. A Piedmontese is baffled to hear a Banker describe a man as having an "antle disposition," but the phrase in comfortably at home in the Smokies.

Lunsford hopes to bring the songs, dances and tunes of these and other regions together at Chapel Hill, not only as an annual reunion of the performers, but also as a for-
