Two members of the Kings Mountain Independents basketball team were chosen for all-tournament honors in Central gymnasium Wednesday night, with Dickie Weaver, star forward of the Tyner all-stars team of Shelby, voted the most outstanding player in the seven games. Weaver was tournament high scorer with 44 points.

Kings Mountain won the trophy, defeating Tyner 39 to 28.

Henry Neisler, who scored a total of 25 points in the three games, he played and was an invaluable floor man for the locals, and Big Ed Hopper of the Kings Mountain team were named to berths on the five-man all-tourney team.

Gold basketballs were presented the five members of the all-tourney group.

Largest crowd of the four night's play saw the final contest, some 350 fans. The final was postponed from last Saturday night due to unfavorable weather conditions. First round games were not well attended due to bad weather.
