T. Scott, State director of the Production and Marketing Administration. In announcing 1948 farm produc-tion goal for the State as set by the Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. Scott said the critical feed supply sit.... tion has made necessary a reduction in the goals for livestock and poultry.

The 1948 goal for corn production is 2,358,000 acres, an increase of 9 per cent over 1947 acreage. The goal for wheat is 600,000 acres, an increase of 15 per cent, and for oats 523,000 acres; an increase of 1 percent.
