

Commission Wants Hunters Opinions

RALEIGH—Tar Heel hunters who wish to have a say in the 1948 hunting season will have a chance to express their opinions at a series of meetings with Wildlife Resources Commission officials, Clyde P. Patton, Executive Director for the Commission said today.

Speaking for the Wildlife Resources Commission, he said that the first of three meetings will be held at the county courthouse in Kinston at 11:00 a. m. April 12. The meetings are designed to give North Carolina sportsmen a chance to express their views on how the 1948 hunting regulations should be set up.

Two more get-togethers are scheduled following the Kinston meeting. The second hearing will be held at Greensboro on April 26, and the final hearing is scheduled for May 10 at Asheville.

"Regulations controlling the take of game birds and animals should be designed to divide the harvestable surplus equally among all citizens who desire to participate in this fine outdoor sport. It must be remembered that breeding stock for next year's season must be saved if we are to perpetuate the species and the sport. Sportsmen are urged to keep those two points in mind when presenting their requests to the Commission at these hearings," Patton said.

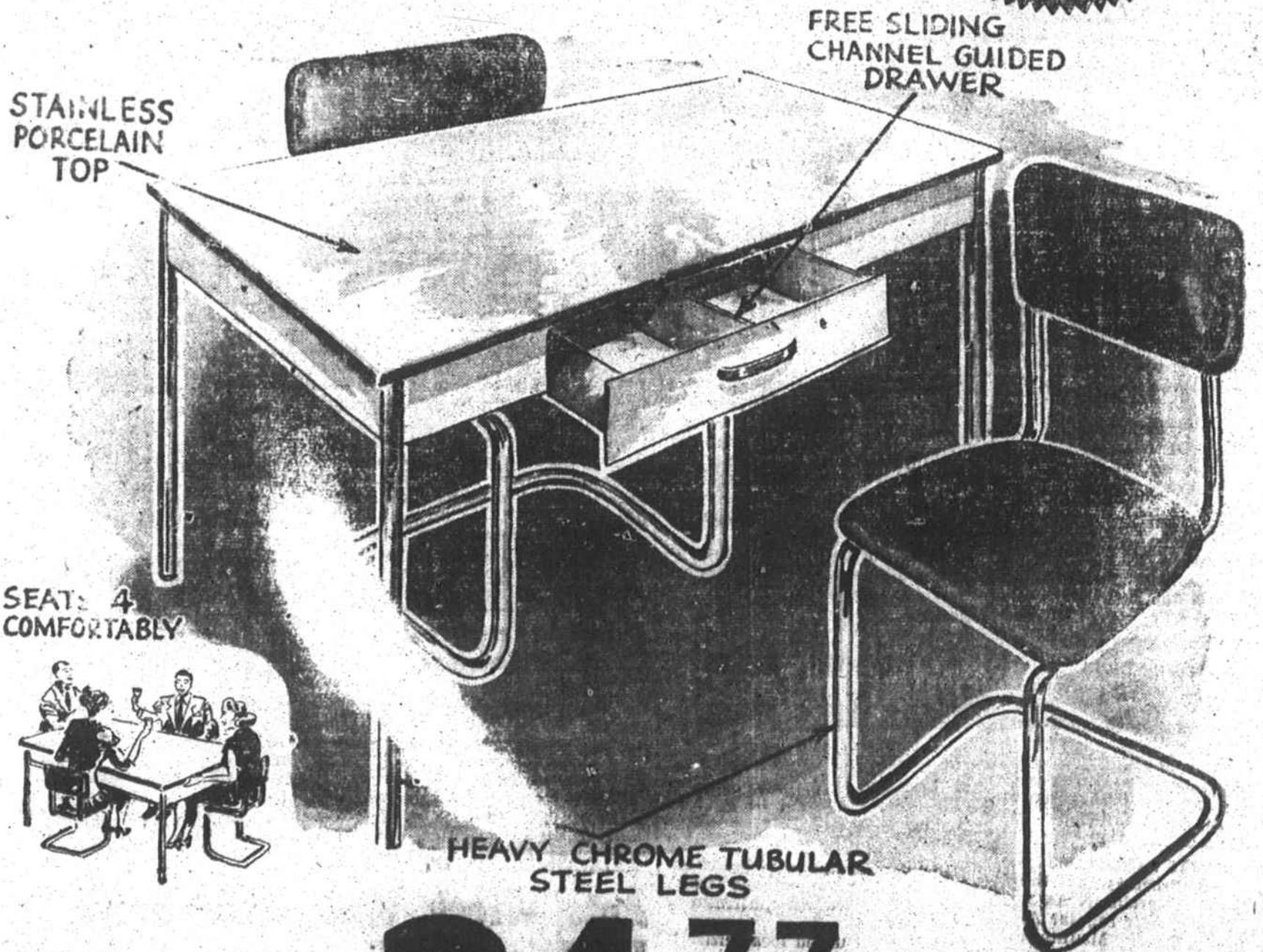
