Mountaineers Rated Favorites In Bessemer City Clash Friday

Coach Shu Carlton's Mountaineers invade the rival Bessemer City high football camp Friday night at 8 p. m. seeking their first win of the season after dropping the opener 24 to 12 to Hendersonville's Bearcats here last Friday night. Kings Mountain is favored to take the Yellow Jackets on the Jacket gridiron.

Kings Mountain lost to Bessemer City last year by score of 6 to 0. All hands should be ready for the Bessemer City game, with Major Loftin's injury in the opener patched up sufficiently.

Jack Rhea and Jack Still have reported to the Mountaineer squad for duty as has Curtis Falls, bringing the squad up to a strength of 26 players. Still is an end, Falls a lineman, and Rhea was placed in tail-

back slot.

Although many local fans rate the Mountaineers as favorites over the Yellow Jackets, Coach Carlton had the drill speeded up considerably this week and cautioned his charges not to take anything for granted.

Kings Mountain returns to City Stadium October 1 for a five-game home stand. They meet North Carolina School for the Deaf in the next home game, then Morganton, Rutherfordton, Spindale, and Cherryville, all Western conference tussles, and close out the home season against Mt. Holly.
