"The nearby town of York put on a flower show and the Kings Mountain ladies became favorably impressed with the idea, after which an annual Flower Show was held in Kings Mountain. The Ladies Aid Societies of the different churches sponsored the show.

"In 1911 the Civic League was organized into a Woman's Club.

"Before his untimely death C. E. Neisler made it known to his family and a few interested friends that he planned to donate a lot on which the Woman's Club could build a club house.

"This most generous courtesy was carried out in 1931 by Mrs. C. E. Neisler and then the struggle to build a club house began. Aid was secured through the Kings Mountain Building & Loan, and finally through the generosity of Mrs. Neisler the last obligation was met.

"The Mauney and the Neisler Mills have contributed most generously toward the building and the upkeep of the club house, and a number of members have given individual gifts which have meant much to the organization.

"The Club has been most fortunate in having many faithful officers. The present treasurer, Mrs. Grady Patterson, has been most efficient and faithful in her duties.

"Business firms have always responded most generously when the soliciting committees call to solicit prizes.

"At present the Woman's Club is under the able leadership of Mrs. Aubrey Mauney."

Motor Lane Busy During Past Week

At Wednesday noon, a total of 647 cars had gone through motor vehicle inspection lane number 4 during the past week.

H. B. Kendrick, supervisor, said the lane had been kept "busy" with an average of 117 cars and trucks per day going through the lane. He said about half passed the tests on the first try, with the other half collecting a red sticker which required repair work to be done.

The lane will return to Kings Mountain October 23 for a five-day stay, according to schedule announced yesterday by the state department of motor vehicles.

Remaining deadlines for inspection of vehicles are:

All motor vehicles of the year models 1938, 1939, 1943, 1944, 1945 shall be inspected on or before October 31, 1948.

All motor vehicles of the year models 1940 and 1942 shall be inspected on or before November 30, 1948.

All motor vehicles of the year models 1941 and 1940 shall be inspected on or before December 31, 1948.
