Invited To Attend Christmas Festival

An invitation has been issued to Kings Mountain high school to participate in the Carolinas' Christmas Festival in Charlotte on November 17 according to announcement made yesterday by Rowell Lane, principal.

According to the plan of the Festival election committee composed of Mrs. Donald Morrison of Camden high school, Camden, S. C., J. D. Kiser of Lincolnton, and F. B. Cudd of Huntersville. Three young ladies of the high school will be nominated by members of the student body and a committee composed of two members of the faculty and one president of a local civic club will make the appointment of the young lady to be official "Princess" for the city.

Last year Miss Barbara Simmons of the local high school was the representative for the event that had an attendance of over 200,000 to see the mammoth parade at 6 P. M. The winner which will be from the 36 girls attending as Princesses will be crowned "Queen Christmas" and will be awarded a beautiful jeweled crown and other valuable prizes. She will reign Queen for a year and will return to Charlotte on the next year to crown her successor.

The local beauty contest representative will be the guest of the Festival event in Charlotte on November the 17th and will be royally entertained. A special luncheon with a nation wide radio star, a big time name orchestra, guest at a football game at 2:30 P. M. between Charlotte Central and Wilson, guest at a buffet, and riding in a mammoth parade at 6 P. M. with a crowd of over 300,000 expected and finally the coronation ball to be held at the Hotel Charlotte and many other events. An announcement will be made at an early date of the radio and movie celebrities to attend the nation's biggest event of its kind. The parade route will be doubled this year and it is expected to be over four miles of decorated units, ending with a gigantic Santa Claus float.
