will make their home in Huntersville.

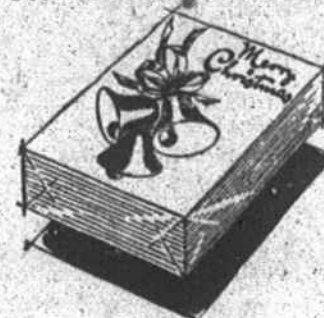
