Coach Mabel Carpenter's girls team looked highly impressive in racking up its first loop win in two starts.

Led by Center Mary Lou Barnette the lassies romped away from the visitors and held a 22 to 6 lead at the half-way mark. Barnette tallied 17 points.

Center McGinnis had 12 to top the Cherryville attack. Floor-play of the Kings Mountain guards and the shooting of Barnette and Jan Reynolds, who had 10 points, paved the way for the local victory.

Jack Ruth paced the Mountaineer attack with 7 goals and three free shots, for a total of 17 points. Bill Amos continued his excellent floor play, taking the ball off both backboards consistently.

Herman Mauney had 11 points

and Amos 10 as the Kings Mountain boys pointed toward the top rung of the conference ladder.

The Mountaineers held a 25-8 half time advantage.
