ATTENTION FISHERMEN! 1949 Fishing Licenses On Sale

Executive Director Clyde P. Patton, of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission has announced that the 1949 fishing licenses are now on sale. Licenses may be purchased from sporting goods dealers, other business firms, and local game

and fish protectors throughout the state.

Fishing License Requirements—quoted from the official abstract: "All persons over 16 years of age who fish by pole and line or rod and reel outside of their county of residence must have in their possession a valid State fishing license or daily permit. A license is required before fishing in one's county of residence if artificial bait is used.

All non-residents over 12 years of age must obtain a state-wide annual fishing license, a 5-day license, or a daily permit before fishing in the waters of this State.

Members of the armed services who are residents of North Carolina and are on furlough are not required to possess a fishing license. Veterans who served overseas and are stationed at a Veterans' Hospital or facility and undergoing treatment there are not required to possess a fishing license. This provision is in force for the duration of World War II and 6 months thereafter.

A landowner and members of his family under 21 years of age may fish in their own property without

the requirements of a fishing license.

Six months' habitation in any county is necessary to constitute legal residence.

Wildlife Commission Approves Increase in Duck Stamp—The North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission has gone on record as favoring action by the 81st Congress to increase the price of the federal duck stamp, according to Clyde P. Patton, Executive Director of the Commission.

The Commission favors increasing the duck stamp fee to \$2.00 and earmarking \$1.00 of that amount for the enforcement of federal migratory waterfowl regulations. The Commission also favors the abolition of the present law which prohibits public shooting on any part of waterfowl refuges which have been or will be in the future purchased with funds derived from the sale of duck stamps.

S. P. C. A. Legislation Approved By Wildlife Commission—At a meeting in Raleigh recently, the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission went on record as favoring legislation sponsored by the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals which would make it unlawful to exhibit captive wild birds and animals near commercial business establishments.

The S. P. C. A. frowns on the practice of displaying wild birds and animals for advertising purposes in the belief that such wild species are not well cared for.

Crappie Limit Removed from Mickie Lake—Tarheel anglers who fish in Mickie Lake in Durham county won't have to worry about the creel limit on crappies this year, according to Clyde P. Patton, Executive Director of the North Carolina Wildlife Commission.

A survey of the lake conducted by the Fisheries Division of the Wildlife Commission disclosed that there is an over-abundance of crappies in the Lake, causing it to be out of balance biologically. In the light of these findings, the Wildlife Commission has resolved to remove the creel limit on crappies taken on hook and line from Mickie Lake from February 1 throughout the remainder of 1949, in order to reduce the excessive crappie population. Creel limits on other game fish species in the lake will remain as indicated in the

1949 fishing regulations.

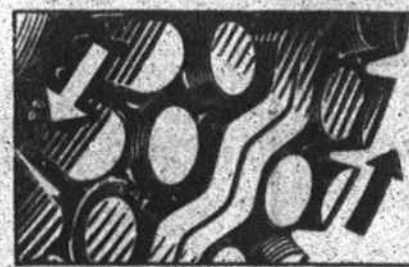
