## Rained-Out Race Set Sunday At Wilkesboro

**NORTH WILKESBORO.** — Rain played havoc with the scheduled 100-lap Southeastern championship stock car race at the famous North Wilkesboro Speedway last Sunday afternoon, but the event has been rescheduled for next Sunday to high light the weekend sports program in North Carolina.

Bill France, popular director of the racing program, announced also that this week's stock car races at Winston-Salem's Bowman Gray stadium would be held Saturday night again this week rather than on Wednesday night.

The Bowman Gray race last Saturday went to Fonty Flock, veteran Spartanburg, S. C., star, with Curtis Turner of Roanoke, Va., finishing second.

Tim Flock's desperate bid for third place in an effort to overtake Pay White on the last lap resulted in serious injury to Aivin Hawkins, chief starter, who was struck by Tim Flock's car.

The 100-lap feature at North Wilkesboro's track next Sunday afternoon should attract a large field of the ranking drivers, including all three Flock brothers, Red Byron, Curtis Turner, Bill Blair, Pap White, Buck Baker, and other top notch performers of the NASCAR circuit.

At present, Turner leads in the Southeastern championship race with a victory at Greensboro with Byron second in the standings.

However, in races at the Wilkesboro track this season, the two Flock brothers, Fonty and Tim, have paced both races and rank among the top favorites for the 100-lapper here Sunday afternoon.

Time trials start at 1 o'clock with the 10-lap consolation slated for 2:45 p. m. and the feature at three o'clock.

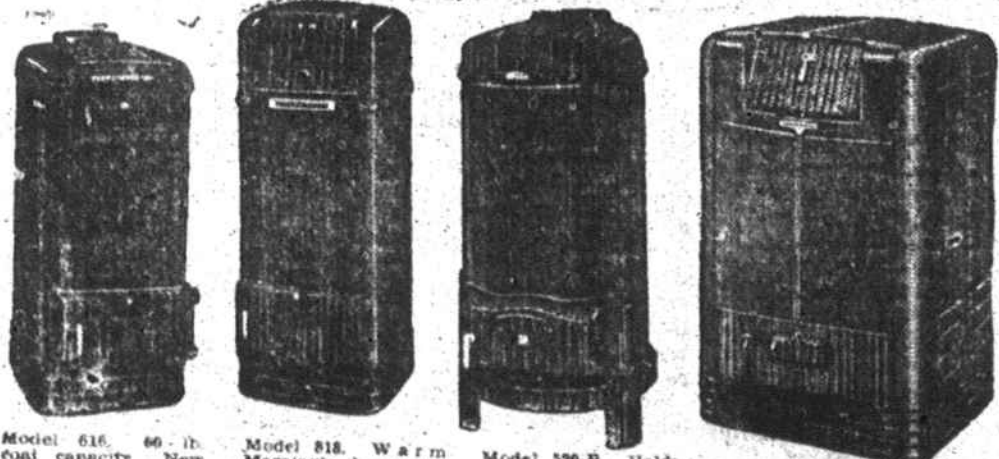
