A tempting salad and sweet course was served.

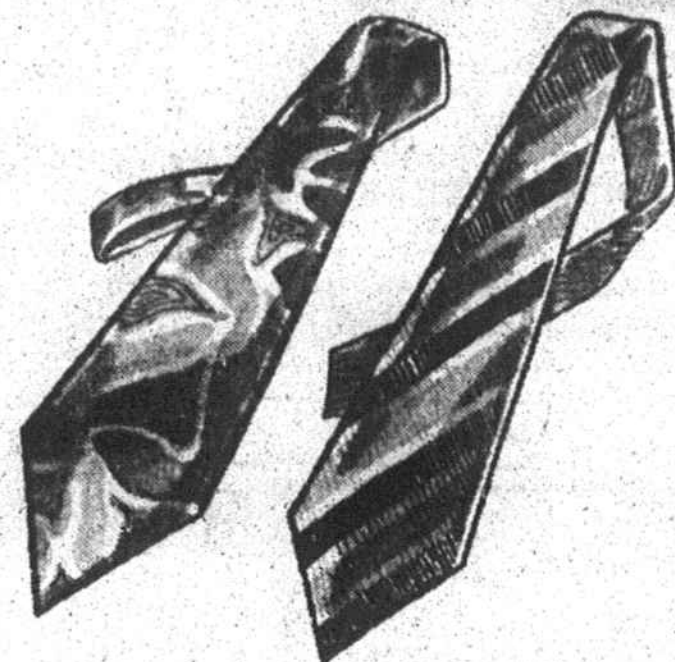
