

Final Rites Held For Wreck Victim

Funeral services were held Wednesday Sept. 21 at McLean & Son Funeral Home, Gastonia, for Benjamin Franklin Ayers, 67, of Ranlo Station who died September 19 injuries suffered when he was struck down by a truck on the Kings Mountain - Gastonia highway on Sept. 16.

Rev. P. T. Brook, pastor of Marietta Street Baptist church, of Gastonia, officiated, assisted by Rev. Earl Armstrong, of Gastonia, and Rev. C. M. Campbell, of Spartanburg, S. C. Interment was in Hollywood cemetery in Gastonia.

State Patrolman Hugh Gray, of Gastonia, who investigated the accident, said Mr. Ayers was walking along the highway in the vicinity of Circle Drive when he was hit by an Associated Transport tractor-trailer driven by Richard Yarborough Reinhardt, 22, of Shelby. Mr. Ayers never regained consciousness

at the hospital. A hospital spokesman said he had suffered a brain concussion.

Mr. Ayers made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Russ Lynn, at Ranlo Station. He was born June 16, 1882 in Cleveland county, and was a member of the Pleasant Hill Baptist church near Shelby.

Surviving are three sons, Emmett Ayers, of Orangeburg, S. C.; Burgin Ayers of Kings Mountain, and Luther Ayers, of Shelby; five daughters, Mrs. Nina Propst, Mrs. Mildred Russ, and Mrs. Edna Lynn of Gastonia, Mrs. Helen Morgan of Spartanburg, and Mrs. Emma Mae Harbin of Anderson, S. C.; two sisters, Mrs. Maggie Mode of Kings Mountain and Mrs. Lucy Riddies of Spartanburg; and 14 grandchildren.

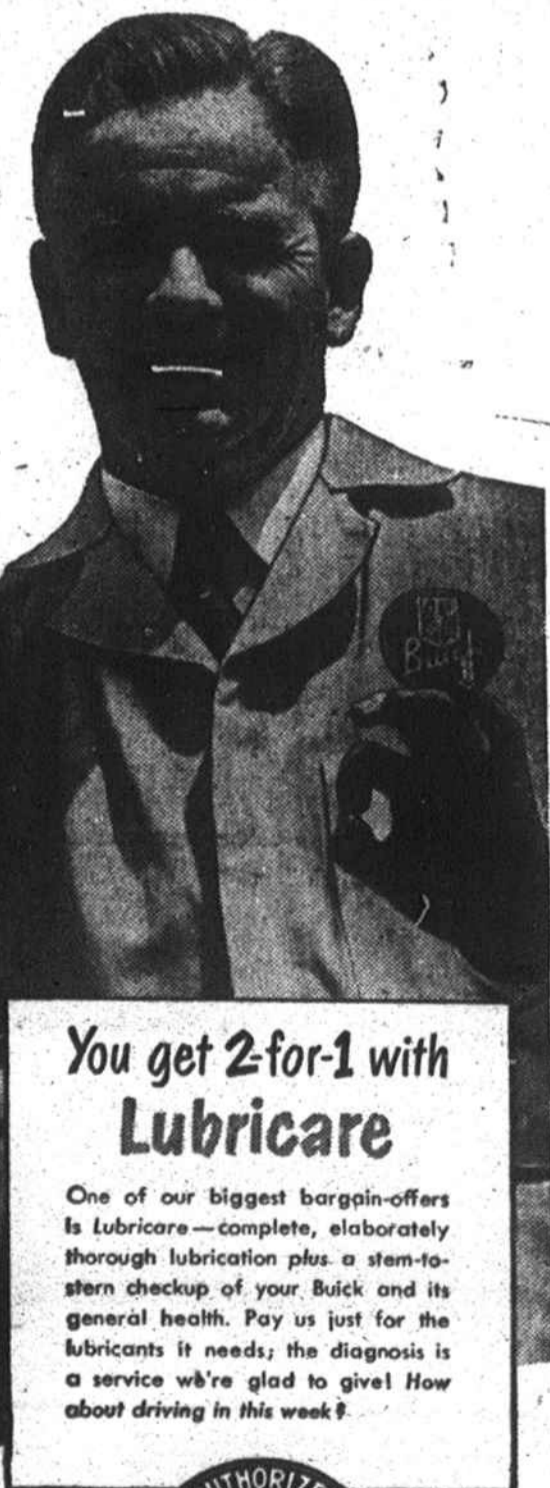
