## NEPH Week: Officials Urge Effort To Employ Physically Handicapped

Next week is National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week, and the Kings Mountain office of the Employment Security commission is participating by calling attention to the nation-wide effort to provide employment for the disabled.

Mrs. Mary B. Goforth, head of the Kings Mountain office, reports there are 21 physically handicapped workers now registered with the local employment office. Ten of this number are veterans of World War II. Some of the 21 are already in training for productive work, and the majority are productive workers who are employed when local textile plants are in full operation, Mrs. Goforth reported. A few of the workers definitely need assistance in job placement, Mrs. Goforth added.

Purposes of NEPH week are:

(1) To promote full public understanding of the problems faced by handicapped workers.

(2) To promote employer acceptance of men and women with physical impairments as able, productive workers in jobs for which they are qualified by experience, aptitude and training.

(3) To promote full understanding by handicapped workers and employers of services available through the local offices of the State Employment Service and their Veterans Employment Representative, the State Offices of Vocational Rehabilitation and the Offices of the Veterans Administration.

(4) To promote job opportunities and continued employment for the communities' handicapped workers.

(5) To encourage employers to list their job openings with local offices of State Employment Agencies in order to widen the job choice for handicapped workers registered for employment.

(6) To encourage handicapped workers who need rehabilitation to take advantage of the services available which include physical restoration, guidance, and training. "Ability counts, not disability," Mrs. Goforth pointed out.

## Pearson Appointed To Weather Bureau

Robert C. Pearson, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Pearson of 117 Oriental avenue, Kings Mountain, has accepted appointment to the U. S. Weather Bureau.

A former Army Air Force soldier, Mr. Pearson was in Kings Mountain last weekend and made the announcement. He was discharged from the service on August 15 after a three-year hitch, during which time he served a year in Greenland. Mr. Pearson will be stationed at the weather outpost between the ar-

ctic (north) pole and the magnetic north pole. He will be a radio operator technician.

He is a graduate of Kings Mountain high school, class of 1946.

He left for Washington Wednesday for training for the job and is expecting to leave the United States sometime in October.
