Dermott Lohr, Former Vet, Dies In Crash

Boyce Dermott Lohr, prominent young Cherryville man, and well-known in Kings Mountain as a member of the semi-pro Vets baseball team of 1947, was killed in an auto accident near Lincolnton. Lohr, 29, was thrown from an overturning state highway patrol car, in which he was a passenger. The husky ex-first baseman of the Vets was popular with Kings Mountain baseball fans. State Patrolman W. R. Boyles, stationed at Cherryville, was driving the car. An occupant of the rear seat, Tad Kilby, 36, of 108 Cone street, Cherryville, incurred facial cuts and a dislocated toe. He was treated at a Lincolnton hospital. The accident occurred about 1:45 a. m.

According to a report issued by Patrol Sgt. E. W. Jones of Shelby, Patrolman Boyles, accompanied by Lohr and Kilby, was chasing another car in an attempt to apprehend a reckless driver. Traveling on the Cherryville-Lincolnton road, they were approaching the Lincolnton city limits. As the car rounded a curve at an intersection a blowout occurred on the left rear tire, the sergeant reports.

Then the driver lost control of the vehicle, which overturned twice, throwing Lohr from the front seat. Sgt. Jones said Boyles suffered minor head injuries and bruises for which he is undergoing treatment at his home in Hickory.

Funeral services for Lohr were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 at his home on North Mountain street, Cherryville. Burial was made in the Lutheran church cemetery in Dallas.

Well-known in the state, Lohr was formerly a professional baseball player with the Mooresville Moors. A native of this county, he was born in Dallas on January 12, 1921. He was a graduate of Cherryville high school. During the late war he was in service four years, spending three years in the European theater of action. For the past several years he was in business with his brother, Shelton Lohr, operating a service station in Cherryville. Within the past six weeks he had opened another establishment, the Cherryville Hatchery.
