Farmers Producing Many Hatching Eggs

Production of hatching eggs in seven western mountain counties of North Carolina has increased more than 700 per cent in the past four years, according to T. K. Jones, farm management analyst at State College.

Estimates by county agents show that a total of 889 farms in Clay, Cherokee, Macon, Jackson, Graham, Swain, and Haywood Counties are now engaged in the hatching egg business, Jones said. The total in 1946 was only 122 farms.

Farmers in these counties sold 209,989 dozen hatching eggs in 1946, 390,963 dozen in 1948, and 528,392 dozen during the first six months of 1949.

Woolard Appointed Supervisor of District Three—Charles Woolard, Wilson, has been appointed fish and game law enforcement supervisor in District Three, according to Clyde P. Patton, executive Director of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission.

Woolard replaces William Norton, Smithfield, who resigned recently to take a position with a Smithfield construction firm.

Woolard has had long and successful experience in fish and game law enforcement work and is deserving of the promotion, Patton said.

Formerly the fish and game protector of Wilson County, Woolard will supervise fish and game law enforcement activities in eleven counties including Edgecombe, Franklin, Halifax, Johnston, Nash, Northampton, Vance, Wake, Warren, Wayne, and Wilson.

1950 Fishing Licenses on Sale—The 1950 licenses to fish in inland waters of the State went on sale January 1, according to Director Patton.

Official abstracts of laws and regulations governing inland fishing for 1950 are being distributed with the licenses by license dealers and game protectors throughout the State.

Protectors to Crack Down on Fish Violations—The Law Enforcement Division of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission has been instructed to bear down on violations of laws and regulations governing fresh water fishing throughout 1950, according to Mr. Patton.

Particular attention will be given to violations regarding the use of illegal devices," Patton said. "Fresh water game fish may be taken legally only by hook and line, rod and reel, or by casting. Game fish taken incidental to the removal of non-game species must be returned to the water."

The Law Enforcement Division has been instructed to check all inland water fishermen to ascertain that they possess proper licenses. All fishing licenses expire with the calendar year except combination hunting and fishing licenses, which are valid from August 1 to July 31.

Close attention will be given to insure that prescribed size and creel limits are observed.
